## Lumina Awards Grant for Racial Justice and Equity to Ilisagvik College Ilisagvik College selected from more than 300 grant proposals

INDIANAPOLIS (January 17, 2019) – Ilisagvik College received a \$50,000 grant from Lumina Foundation's Fund for Racial Justice and Equity, a project of Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors, to fund exploratory activities regarding Indigenous self-determination and racial equity, as well as the initial development of a Cultural Competency program.

From a pool of 312 nation-wide applicants, Ilisagvik was one of 19 college and universities selected to receive funding from Lumina's Fund for Racial Justice and Equity, created last year in response to racially motivated violence in Charlottesville on the campus of the University of Virginia.

"As a philanthropic leader, Lumina shares a deep passion and concern about the nation's racial climate, especially on college campuses," said Jamie Merisotis, president and CEO of Lumina Foundation. "These campuses have shown a willingness to address racial disparities at a systemic level: They recognize that achieving equitable results is about more than promoting diversity – it's about whether the institution fosters a climate in which every student feels welcome and has the same opportunity to earn a degree or certificate of value, regardless of race or ethnicity."

In partnership with Rockefeller Philanthropy Advisors, Lumina evaluated grant applications submitted in response to a request for proposals. The number of responses indicates a strong desire throughout higher education to improve campus culture through community dialogues, faculty and staff development, and other creative approaches. Lumina received proposals from a wide breadth of institutions, including 2- and 4-year, public and private, large and small, and minority-serving.

Dr. Pearl Brower, President of Ilisagvik College, led the endeavor to pursue the Lumina Foundation grant. The idea to develop a Cultural Competency program has been at the forefront of the College's objectives for the last two years, and the grant poses "an opportunity to invite discussion and collaboration on racial and Indigenous equity at Ilisagvik in order to strengthen our cultural understanding and perpetuate Iñupiaq values," according to President Brower.
